It is presented to the Parishioners of St. Mary as a reminder and as an aid to remain steady in the practice of the Catholic Faith by re-discovering traditional devotions. Indeed this Prayer Book has been developed in response to some Parishioners who regularly attended Mass on Friday morning and desired to deepen their prayer life by praying new devotions after Mass. On this Anniversary of my Ordination, 5 of August, the Church celebrates the Memorial of the Dedication of the Basilica of St. Mary Major in Rome. It is a Marian Feast. 

The Introductory Rites help the faithful come together as one, establish communion and prepare themselves to listen to the Word of God and to celebrate the Eucharist worthily.

Sign of the Cross

All make the Sign of the Cross as the Priest says: In the name of the Father, the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. (R) Amen.

Greeting

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all. (R) And with your spirit.

Penitential Act

Then one of the Penitential Acts follows:

The Confiteor

I confess to almighty God and to you, my brothers and sisters, that I have greatly sinned, in my thoughts and in my words, in what I have done and in what I have failed to do.

Striking your breast three times, say: through my fault, through my fault, through my most grievous fault;

therefore I ask blessed Mary ever-Virgin, (R) Christe, elesion. all the Angels and Saints, and you, my brothers and sisters, to pray for me to the Lord our God.

Lord, have mercy

The Priest invites the faithful to the Penitential Act. You were sent to heal the contrite of heart: Lord, have mercy. (R) Lord, have mercy.

> You came to call sinners: Christ, have mercy (R) Christ, have mercy.

> You are seated at the right hand of the Father to intercede for us: Lord, have mercy. (R) Lord, have mercy.

Kyrie, elesion (kir-ree-eh el-eh-zon)

Christe, elesion

The Gloria

Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to people of good will. We praise you, we bless you, we adore you, we glorify you, we give you thanks for your great glory, Lord God, heavenly King, O God, almighty Father. Lord Jesus Christ, Only Begotten Son, Lord God, Lamb of God, Son of the Father. you take away the sins of the world, have mercy on us; you take away the sins of the world, receive our prayer; you are seated at the right hand of the Father. have mercy on us. For you alone are the Holy One, you alone are the Lord, you alone are the Most High, lesus Christ. with the Holy Spirit. in the glory of God the Father. Amen

The Collect

When the Gloria or a hymm if it is the Lenten Season is concluded, the Priest, says:

Let us pray.

And all pray in silence with the Priest for a while. Then the Priest says the Collect prayer, at the end of which the people acclaim:

(R) Amen.



By hearing the word proclaimed in worship, the faithful again enter into the unending dialogue between God and the covenant people, a dialogue sealed in the sharing of the Eucharistic food and drink.

First Reading

To indicate the end of the reading, the lector acclaims: The word of the Lord. (R) Thanks be to God.

Psalm

After the First Reading the psalmist or cantor sings or says the Psalm, with the people making the response.

Second Reading

On Sundays and certain other days there is a second reading. It concludes with the same response as the first reading. (R) Thanks be to God.



Gospel Reading

This is the high point of the Liturgy of the Word so all stand to respect the Word.

The Lord be with you. (R) And with your spirit. A reading from the holy Gospel according to (gospel writer) (R) Glory to you, O Lord.

At the end of the Gospel, the Deacon, or the Priest, acclaims: The Gospel of the Lord.

(R) Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

The Homily

All sit during the homily. At the end of the Homily it is appropriate for there to be a brief silence for recollection.

The Nicene Creed

On Sundays and Solemnities, the Profession of Faith or Creed will follow. During Lent and Easter Time, especially, the Apostles' Creed may be used.

I believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible. I believe in one Lord Jesus Christ, the only-begotten Son of God, born of the Father before all ages, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, consubstantial with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven

All bow up to and including became man and by the power of the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and became man.



This Creed is the spiritual seal, our heart's meditation and an ever-present guardian; it is, unquestionably,



Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC 197)

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried, and rose again on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures. He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is adored and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. I believe in one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church. I confess one baptism for the forgiveness of sins, and I look forward to the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come.

The Apostles' Creed can be found in the section of Devotions dedicated to Praying the Rosary.



For Catholics, the Eucharist is the source and summit of the whole Christian life. It is the vital center of all that the Church is and does, because at its heart is the real presence of the crucified, risen and glorified Lord, continuing and making available his saving work among us.

Preparation of the Altar & Prayer over the Offerings

During the Offertory Song the gifts of bread and wine are brought in procession. The Priest offers the prayers of blessing quietly at the altar. If the priest says the prayers aloud the assembly's acclamation each time is:

(R) Blessed be God for ever.

The Priest completes additional personal preparatory rites, and the people rise as he says:

Pray, my brothers and sisters, that my sacrifice and yours may be acceptable to God, the almighty Father.

(R) May the Lord accept the sacrifice at your hands for the praise and glory of his name, for our good and the good of all his holy Church.

Then the Priest says the Prayer over the Offerings, at the end of which the people acclaim: **(R) Amen.**

The Eucharistic Prayer

The Lord be with you. (R) And with your spirit. Lift up your hearts. (R) We lift them up to the Lord. Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. (R) It is right and just.

Holy, Holy, Holy (Sanctus)

Holy, Holy, Holy Lord God of hosts. Heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

The Mystery of Faith

We proclaim your Death, O Lord, and profess your Resurrection until you come again.

Or:

When we eat this Bread and drink this Cup, we proclaim your Death, O Lord, until you come again.

Or:

Save us, Saviour of the world, for by your Cross and Resurrection you have set us free.

At the conclusion of the prayer the Priest takes the chalice and the paten with the host and, raising both, he says:

Through him, and with him, and in him, O God, almighty Father, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all glory and honour is yours, for ever and ever.

Doxology of St. Mary (The Great Amen)

Amen, Amen, Amen, Amen Blessing and glory, wisdom, thanksgiving, and honor power and might belong to the Lord forever and ever Amen.

Our Great Amen was brought to St. Mary with the appointment of Father Sylvester Onyeachonam in January 2019. If Father is not presiding sometimes there may be a simple Amen said.

The Apostles' Creed

I believe in God, the Father Almighty, Creator of Heaven and earth; and in Jesus Christ, His only Son Our Lord, Who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried.

He descended into Hell; the third day He rose again from the dead; He ascended into Heaven, and is seated at the right hand of God, the Father almighty; from thence He shall come to judge the living and the dead.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy Catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body and life everlasting. Amen.

Our Father | The Lord's Prayer

Our Father, Who art in heaven, Hallowed be Thy Name. Thy Kingdom come. Thy Will be done, on earth as it is in Heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. Amen.

Hail Mary

Hail Mary, Full of Grace, The Lord is with thee. Blessed art thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of thy womb, Jesus. Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners now, and at the hour of our death. Amen.

Glory Be | Glory to the Father

Glory to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit As it was in the beginning, is now, and will be forever. Amen.

O My Jesus | The Fatima Prayer

O my Jesus, forgive us our sins, save us from the fires of Hell and lead all souls to Heaven, especially those most in need of Thy Mercy. Amen.

Hail Holy Queen

Hail, holy Queen, mother of mercy, our life, our sweetness, and our hope. To thee do we cry, poor banished children of Eve. To thee do we send up our sighs mourning and weeping in this valley of tears. Turn then, most gracious advocate, thine eyes of mercy toward us, and after this our exile show us the blessed fruit of thy womb, Jesus. O clement, O loving, O sweet Virgin Mary.

(V) Pray for us, O Holy Mother of God.

(R) That we may be made worthy of the promises of Christ.

Rosary Prayer

(V) Let us pray,

(R) O God, whose only begotten Son, by His life, death, and resurrection, has purchased for us the rewards of eternal salvation. Grant, we beseech Thee, that while meditating on these mysteries of the most holy Rosary of the Blessed Virgin Mary, that we may both imitate what they contain and obtain what they promise, through Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Angelus

The Angel of the Lord declared unto Mary... And she conceived of the Holy Spirit. Hail Mary... Behold the handmaid of the Lord... Be it done unto me according to Your word. Hail Mary... And the Word was made Flesh... and dwelt among us. Hail Mary... Pray for us, O Holy Mother of God... That we may be made worthy of the promises of Christ.

Angel of God | Guardian Angel Prayer

Angel of God...

My guardian dear, to whom God's love commits me here, ever this day, be at my side, to light, to guard, to rule and to guide. Amen.

Prayer to St. Michael the Archangel

St. Michael the Archangel, defend us in battle. Be our defense against the wickedness and snares of the devil. May God rebuke him we humbly pray, and do you, O Prince of the heavenly host, by the power of God, cast into Hell, Satan and all the other evil spirits, who prowl about the world for the ruin of souls.
